



# Plan On Having A Grand Time In

Grand Rivers, Kentucky, is an idyllic, welcoming tourist destination that sits on the north end of Land Between the Lakes and features some of the most distinctive attractions around the 178,000 acre national recreation area. A recent visitor said "I absolutely love this little town. I always refer to it as a Hallmark movie town!" It is a sentiment shared by many, as Grand Rivers receives over 350,000 visitors a year.

Grand Rivers is best known as the home of Patti's

1880s Settlement, a restaurant once named the best non-chain in the Southeast by Southern Living magazine. It is famous for two inch pork chops, "mile high" meringue on an assortment of mouth-watering pies and incredible service. What began as a small family eatery has grown into one of Western Kentucky's most noted attractions.

A fire a few years

ago threatened this treasure, but the rebuild has turned out to be an extraordinary new beginning. A video "The Evolution of a Dream," chronicles the events. from destruction to the installation of furnishings and the welcoming of guests. The new building features a huge open atrium and a drop off for bus riders, but the collection of dining rooms format remains. Now each room is themed, including one with a museum worthy collection of US Presidential framed letters and another with family photos. The down time between the fire and the unveiling of the new format created an opportunity for creative thinking. A food truck next to the restaurant site served sandwiches and chips and a new restaurant, T Lawson's Grill, opened across the street. T Lawson's is a pub with amazing food and a brass bar. The relaxed atmosphere is more conducive to individuals and families than groups, but the creatively prepared high quality food is still pure Patti's style.

The shops which surrounded the restaurant are back too, including a new full boutique liquor store, Calvin Swine Moonshine. There are free daily moonshine tastings and it is available for sale online as well. Be sure and ask for the story behind the name, which is based on a pig who was dressed up, walked through the streets on a leash and was supposedly fond of "shine."

Across the street from Patti's is the Badgett Playhouse,

a Branson-style family venue that features comedy and musical performances designed to please. Offerings include everything from musical murder mysteries that have lots of audience participation to spectacles with the music of the 1970s or 80s. Every show is professionally produced and affordable for the whole family or group. There are also dinner theaters, country music and gospel shows and holiday

events. Owner Bill Minihan and his troupe never disappoint. For tickets or more information, go to www.badgett-playhouse.com.

The Rose of the Lake Bed and Breakfast is located at 293 Lawson Avenue in Grand Rivers. It offers nonsmoking, suites and family rooms and the amenities include a pool. The staff invites you to "a piece of heaven, quiet, romantic and a golf cart ride to everything in beau-





Celebrating a bicentennial requires some planning and Paris and Henry County have chosen to party together! The respective birthdays happen two years apart, so the city (September 23, 1823) and county (November 7, 1821) are planning a two year party that includes every community in the county. Colorful Henry County shaped "200" signs

have already gone up.



This year's Grand Parade, which follows the week of activities, is scheduled for Saturday, March 19, 2022. The theme is "Irish Day Celebration Back on Track in '22". The parade begins at the Houston County Middle School and travels to the Houston County Community Hospital. The carnival is on

Front Street, while the food and craft vendors are set up on the Erin Square, Front Street, Spring Street and Atkins Street. Entertainment is on the Erin Square Stage.

Approximatley 5000 people typically attend Irish Day. It is frequently listed among the family friendly St. Patick's Day events

for Nashville and surrounding communities. It has been noted as one of the best rural Irish celebrations east of Chicago.

Past themes have included "Get Your Shamrock On," "Erin Tennessee Is the Place to Be on Irish Day 2017," "When I-Rish Upon a Shamrock," "Roots

of the Irish Run Deep," "20/20: A Wee Bit of Ireland in Tennessee," and "Houston County's 150th Birthday."

Erin as "a charming county seat"
with "many unique shops including antiques and an old-fashioned flea market. A two mile





After a two year hiatus due to the COVID19 pandemic, the Bull Blowout returned to the Cherry Expo Center in Murray, Kentucky. Audiences packed the grandstands on Friday, February 11th as well as the following Saturday in what organizer Penny Parsons called a spectacular turnout.

The main event at the Bull Blowout is, of course, bull riding. Referred to as 'the most dangerous eight seconds in sports', bull riding can be traced

contests of equestrian and ranching skills known as charreada. As hispanic cattle hands traveled north into California and Texas they brought the contests with them, where they were of interest to their Anglo coworkers. There were many organized competitions through the 1800s and into the early 20th century,

back to Mexican

eventually leading to the creation of the Professional Rodeo Cowboy Association in the 1930s. Both the PRCA and the Professional Bull Riders organize several bull riding events in modern times, overseeing judging the individual riders. While the Murray Bull Blowout is put on by Parsons and Milam Roughstock

Contractors and Promoters, they abide by the PRCA rulebook when it comes to scoring points.

In addition to bull riding, barrel racing is a large part of the activities at the Bull Blowout. An equestrian competition that involves galloping around barrels in a cloverleaf pattern, barrel racing was

developed as an event for women. Today it is usually open to all genders, and a part of most rodeo events. This is a timed event, often requiring an electric eye to capture the most accurate speeds. It places a rider's horsemanship on full display, as well as the speed, agility, and intelligence of their mount.

One of the less strictly organized events at the Bull Blowout is the mutton busting. Introduced in the 1980s, mutton busting is a children's event with no overarching national regulations. In it, sheep are held still while children are placed on their backs in a riding position. Onced freed the sheep generally take off at a run in an attempt to shake the child off. Much like a cross between bull riding and barrel racing this event is timed,

the winner being the child who is able to hold on the longest. Another event for underage participants is the calf scramble. In it a large group of calves and an even larger group of teenagers are let loose into the ring. The teenagers then attempt to rope, halter, and then coax a calf into a specific area of the ring. It is generally a chaotic, exciting event.

While many of the participants of the Bull Blowout were from Western Kentucky this year, there were also a great deal of competitors from out of town. People traveled from Tennessee, Indiana, Missouri, and as far away as Alberta, Canada. All of the out of state competitors are expected to be back next year for the 2023 Bull Blowout as well.



Organized by the Paris-Henry County Jaycees, the World's Biggest Fish Fry is Paris Tennessee's signature event. It is scheduled for April 23 - 30, 2022. People love the carnival, rodeo and other festivities, but the longest lines are always around the fish tent. Fried catfish and all the trimmings have not actually been prepared in a tent for years. The Bobby Cox Memorial is now housed in the Commercial building at the Henry County Fairgrounds, 517 Royal Oak Drive, in Paris. Plans are already set for over 12,500 pounds to be served this year, along with french fries, cole slaw, hushpuppies and white beans. The Fish Tent traditionally opens on the Wednesday (April 27th this year) of Fish Fry week and food is served each evening through Friday and beginning at 11 am on

Saturday (April

30th).

It is not uncommon for folks to plan their vacations and family reunions around Fish Fry and making their way to the hot fish and fixings is a priority. Generations of families have made visiting the Fish Tent together part of their annual gatherings. Grown children return and share their traditions with their own little ones.

Southernthing.com writer Kelly Kazak says "It's no secret southerners love food. We eat for comfort, we eat to celebrate, we eat because our food is so yummy. So it should come as no surprise that we also love food festivals." This will be the 69th year that people have been enjoying the crispy fish at the World's Biggest Fish Fry.

Eating is not the only way to enjoy the Fish Tent. Local organizations begin signing up to take their turn serving early in the spring. Many groups,

from elected officials to downtown merchants, want to serve the same night they have scheduled for years. Four major tourist attractions are aligned along the 40 mile Woodlands Trace National Scenic Byway which bisects Land Between the Lakes National Recreation E Area north to south, the Woodlands Nature Station, an Elk and Bison Prairie, the Golden Pond Visitor Center, Planetarium and Observatory and the Homeplace 1850s Working Farm and Living History Museum. Land Between the Lakes spans 178,000 acres in Western

Kentucky and West await visitors. The Tennessee. A pair of red

wolves make the Woodlands Nature Station their home, along with an eagle, coyotes, deer, birds of prey and many other species. There is also a beautiful backyard garden and ongoing special programming to introduce adults and little ones to indigenous species, habitats and conservation efforts. Designed to commemorate the site of a plane crash that took the lives of country music legends, the Patsy Cline Memorial is located at 2082 Mt. Carmel Road in Camden, Tennessee. Along with "Crazy" vocalist Cline, Cowboy Copas, Hawkshaw Hawkins and their pilot, Randy Hughes, were killed on March 5, 1963, returning to Nashville following a benefit concert.

A recent visitor said the memorial was "absolutely amazing" and "we even danced in the gazebo to Patsy Cline and no one else was there..." He described the location as "peaceful and well kept..." Atlas Obscura says "What the site lacks in grandeur it makes up for in an atmosphere of quiet reflection."

An engraved rock marks the spot, along with a kiosk, walkway, cross and fan memorials. The site is nestled in a setting described as 'somber.' There is no admission fee and it is open year round. The Paris-Henry County Heritage Center, located at 614 North Poplar Street in Downtown Paris, is dedicated to the history of the city and county. Suzy Herron serves as the executive director. Housed in Cavitt Place, an historical Italian Revival mansion built in 1916. The facility serves as museum and cultural center, housing artifacts and memorabilia, and as a venue for special events. It is supported by community grants, as well as individual and corporate contributions. Exhibits may be local or visiting and there is an ongoing Lunch and Learn activity. The Heritage Center is now serving as the headquarters for the city and county's bicentennial celebrations.

Cavitt Place was built by Colonel O.C. Barton, a business man and philanthropist, who enjoyed it with his wife Tillie and their children. It has since served as an Army office during World War II,

the county health department and the offices of TVA. It has been described as 'the jewel of West Tennessee'.





The story of how a replica of the Eiffel Tower came to stand in a park in West Tennessee is really the tale of a small city embracing its namesake and adopting a symbol.

Engineering students at Christian Brothers University in Memphis, Tennessee, constructed a wooden replica of the famous tower as part of a Memphis in May celebration in 1990. After the festival, it became a little

too popular with students who were climbing it despite it being a temporary structure. Christian Brothers offered the tower to Paris, Tennesssee, where it was placed in what was then called Memorial Park. The structure was eventually rebuilt in steel by Keith Jackson, owner of Precision Grinding and Machine, on behalf of the City of Paris.

Memorial Park was eventually renamed Eiffel Tower Park

as the replica became a tourist attraction and was used extensively by city entities and the business community to brand themselves. Lighting enhancements were added in 2017 and the tower can now reflect seasons, athletic competitions and other causes. A lit replica of Santa climbing the structure was part of the Christmas celebration in 2021.

The tower is maintained by the City of Paris.





Sponsored by the Paris-Henry County Chamber of commerce, the Water Fun Run is a boating event held on Kentucky Lake. Participants travel between the different marinas, resorts, and restaurants on the water, in the hopes of collecting enough stamps to win one of three prizes.

Boating on Kentucky Lake is a pastime enjoyed by a myriad of people, and this event takes full advantage of the two hundred and fifty square miles of beautiful water. Collecting the stamps to play is simple. Once on the water, boaters

travel to different participating attractions across Kentucky Lake where volunteers will be standing ready when they arrive, ink pads in hand. Players will receive stamps on their play packet, proving they made it to the stop in question.

Each stamp that players receive will be counted up at the final check in station later that day. Depending on how many stamps they have received they will be dealt playing cards at random. With the cards dealt to them they must then configure the best poker hand they can to win. The

more stops a player makes it to the better odds they have of winning, but it's only necessary to make it to five in order to deal a full legal hand.

The many different Water Fun Run stops vary from year to year. This year's stops have not been announced as of writing this article, however there are a few usual locations. Buchanan Resort, Fat Daddy's, and Paris Landing State Park are generally all stops on the Water Fun Run. Additionally, there is a traveling party boat on Kentucky Lake. As for the prizes handed out, there is a grand prize for the best assembled poker hand, as well as ones for second and third place.

A twenty eight year tradition, the Soybean Festival in Martin, Tennessee is set for September 7th through the 10th this year. A celebration of both the crop and the people who farm it, the festival unites the University of Tennessee at Martin with local businesses, agriculturalists, churches, and other organizations to make this event the showstopper it has grown to become.

Boasting celebrity performers like Tim McGraw and Suzy Bogguss, the first Soybean Festival was kicked off by both local leaders and UT Martin in 1994. Organizers of particular note included Dr. Jerry Gresham, Mayor Larry Taylor, and Park Wells of the Tennessee Soybean Promotion Council. They, along with several others, brainstormed the events that eventually developed into the largest tourist attraction in Martin Tennessee. Those events included a cheerleading competition and an antique tractor pull, as well as a tour of UT Martin.

These days the festival has grown exponentially, but it still charmingly harkens back to those early days. There is still an annual truck and tractor pull, along with more modern traditions. Among those are the annual Chicken Crazy Hog Wild BBQ free community meal and a Sandwich Eating Contest held in Virginia Weldon Park. Other attractions include a carnival with rides, sidewalk sales, and a concert held downtown.

One of the biggest attractions is the Soybean Parade. Stretching down University and Lindell streets, the parade is a staple of Martin. Featuring floats, trucks, marching bands, and other walkers, the parade takes place on the fourth day of the festival. Visitors are free to bring chairs and station themselves along the almost mile long route, enjoying the people and vehicles passing by in their best parade outfits and decorations.

With so many amazing events, the Soybean festival couldn't go unrecognized by organizers in the region. In 2019 they won a total of nine medals from the Southeast Festival and Events Association Conference hosted in Pigeon Forge, Tennessee. Of those medals five were gold, including Best Marketing Campaign, Best Print Ad, Best Children's Programing, Best Social Media Marketing, and Best TV Ad or Public Service Announcement. They also took silver medals for Best Festival Overall, Best Festival or Event Website, Best Promotional Poster, and bronze for Best Volunteer.

Few local facilities can match the Tennessee River Folklife Interpretive Center and Museum at Nathan Bedford Forrest State Park for the view or the rich understanding of a rural, river-based economy and people. It is located at 1825 Pilot Knob Road in Eva, Tennessee, 38333. The center also features a small nature

exhibit, theater, Civil War interpretations, a gift shop and the Tennessee River Overlook at Pilot Knob, one of the highest points in West Tennessee and a magnificent spot to gaze at the water and shoot photos.

The Center explores river navigation, logging, commercial fishing and musselling.

There are jon and brail boats on display, crafts, videos on park history and river life and an explanation of General Nathan Bedford Forrest's attack on Johnsonville.

Forrest State Park offers over 25 miles of hiking trails, from one quarter to 20 miles, ranging from easy to rugged. Stop by the park office for a trail map. Lodging is available in seven cabins (two are pet friendly), which include decks overlooking the river. Each cabin can sleep up to eight people. There is one rustic cabin on a secluded ridge, built in the 1930s and renovated. RV, backcountry and primitive camping are featured. A separate campground is reserved for supervised youth groups. The group lodge can sleep 64.

The 2,650 acre park began as a local project during the Depression by the Works Progress Administration. It

opened in 1929 and later became part of the Tennessee State Park system. The management team participates in TVA's Green Power Switch and tracks energy use to find areas of improvement. NBF State Park is a proponent of Leave No Trace, a philosophy of outdoor recreation which encourages everyone to:

Bedford Forrest, a cavalry leader who attacked and destroyed the federal supply and munitions depot at Johnsonville on Trace Creek. His operations were centered around the sandy beach open Tennessee River, in the vicinity of the park and the town of Eva.

Five picnic pavillions are just off the main road and can be reserved up to two years in advance. Playgrounds are provided for softball, volleyball, horseshoes and disc golf.

Three boat access ramps are available. A Tennessee fishing license is required for those over 13. Small-

mouth, largemouth and striped bass, sauger, crappie, bream and catfish are common. Swimming is popular at the Eva Beach site, which is an unsupervised, to the public at no charge.


